United States Hosts 2026 International Congress of Mathematicians

The International Congress of Mathematicians (ICM) 2026 will be held in Philadelphia, 23–30 July 2026. The 20th International Mathematical Union (IMU) General Assembly in New York City will precede this, 20–21 July 2026.¹

The first ICM was held in 1897. Since 1900, ICMs take place every four years. Only twice before has the United States been chosen as the host country—the 11th congress in 1950 and the 20th congress in 1986.

An ICM showcases what is going on in contemporary mathematics. Hosting one is a source of pride for host country mathematicians and politicians.

The scientific prizes awarded by the IMU are the highest distinctions in the mathematical world and are awarded every four years at the Opening Ceremony of the ICM. The most famous is the **Fields Medal**. The Fields Medal was first awarded in 1936 and is considered our “Nobel Prize.”² The hosting nation’s leader often attends the Opening Ceremony.

Hosting ICM 2026 provides a platform for the United States to declare 2026 the “Year of Math.”

Organizers are working with Philadelphia schools, museums, libraries, and other public institutions to highlight mathematics during ICM 2026. This will include daily public events in an auditorium that seats 4,500.

Satellite conferences and other events to engage the public with mathematics are held in the host country throughout the year.

¹ IMU is an international nongovernmental and nonprofit scientific organization, with the purpose of promoting international cooperation in mathematics. It is a member of the International Science Council (ISC).
